February 28, 2024 - Regular Meeting Minutes – On a motion by C. Sevarino, second by H. Spencer, to approve the Board minutes. PASSED with a unanimous vote.

Spencer, the Board voted barring any urgent matters to cancel the March 27, 2024 regular Board of Education meeting. PASSED with a unanimous vote.

IX. CURRICULUM REPORT

D. Rouillard presented the curriculum report. The report highlighted the 2024 Summer Enrichment Program which will be offered to the students of East Windsor Public Schools. The program will run Monday through Friday for six consecutive weeks over the summer for 20 to 60 students per week thanks to a grant received by the district. Discussion ensued regarding the various specifics of the program. The Board thanked D. Rouillard for his hard work in obtaining the grant. D. Rouillard thanked C. Gustafson and M. Maltese for the collaboration. A copy of the report was provided to the Board.

XI. EDUCATOR DIVERSITY PLAN PRESENTATION

C. Gustafson and T. Rodriguez presented the Educator Diversity Plan to the Board. The plan highlighted the district's commitment to hiring top talent that is diversified and representative of the students in the district. The Board thanked C. Gustafson and T. Rodriguez for their work.

On a motion by N. Farmer, second by H. Spencer, the Board voted to approve the East Windsor Public Schools educator diversity plan as presented. PASSED with a unanimous vote.

Farmer advised the Board that the Athletics Subcommittee met with D. Edwards. A survey was developed and distributed to Broad Brook Elementary School and East Windsor Middle School families to gauge interest in youth sports. E. LeBorious shared with the Board that she and D. Menard attended the Tacos and Talent event. Both were very impressed with the student performances. F. Neill attended the 4th grade band concert as well as the middle school choir and band concert. She noted how impressed she was with the performances.

Broad Brook School Report

On March 25th, Broad Brook School students enjoyed a performance of Dot, Dot, Dot, the Musical by Theaterworks. Students read the book before watching the play and participated in extension activities in art class or with their buddy classes.

Students in grades 3 and 4 started taking the Smarter Balanced Assessment this week. During the course of the year they practiced using the Interim Assessments each month and engaged in additional practice over the past few weeks to prepare for the assessments. On April 2nd Chompers from the Yard Goats came to an assembly to cheer them on and encourage them to do their best. Prizes were raffled off. They are ready to do their best.

Over April vacation, all BBS students will participate in a learning challenge. They can complete a bingo chart with math and literacy activities to win a prize and be entered into a raffle to win a Barnes and Noble gift card.

Middle School Report

EWMS overall attendance rate for the month of March was 93.80 and 5th Grade had the highest grade level attendance rate at 96.91% for the month of March!

The 5th and 6th grade chorus students recently visited the East Windsor Senior Center where they performed a selection of songs. Engaging in conversations with the seniors was a highlight for the students and they eagerly anticipate their next visit.

EWMS hosted a Pep Rally on April 5th to launch the SBA/NGSS testing period. The event featured a spirited basketball game between staff and students. Today marked the start of the testing for EWMS.

Spring sports are starting with more than 50 students joining track and field, alongside 12 students in softball. The softball team's inaugural game is scheduled for April 22nd at Stafford, while the first track and field event will take place on April 17th in Tolland.

High School Report

The 4th Annual Think About Your Future Week was held at East Windsor High School from March 18th-March 22nd. This week focuses on College & Career Readiness. Students participated in a variety of activities including preparing for Career Speakers Day and Scholar Check-in during advisory, P/SAT testing, 5 Field Trips (including the Hartford National College Fair, UCONN, Elms College, Springfield College, Western New England University and CT State at Asnuntuck), Senior Exit Interview, Scholar Check-in Day (individual conferences with teachers on their Panther Report and goals) and Career Speaker Day. On Career Speakers Day, we hosted a diverse group of professionals including a nurse, lawyer, electrician, marine biologist, photographer, hair stylist, engineer, physical therapist, mechanic, etc. Thank you to students and staff for making the week a success!

The senior class is preparing for their last quarter of senior year. Their prom is April 26th at Villa Louisa from 6-10pm, senior outing is at Brownstone on May 24th, and their banquet is May 31st at Merlot on the Water.

The sophomore class raised almost \$500 at their Red Robin fundraiser last month.

The building committee and Student Government are working on planning end of year engagement activities.

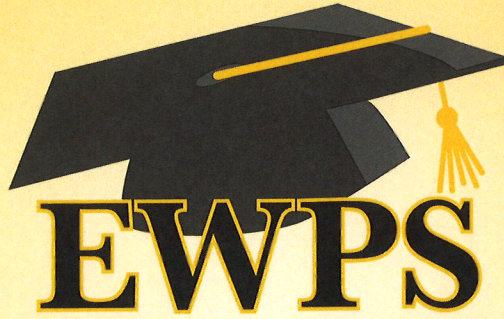
LEO club is planning to beautify the courtyard on Earth day after school.

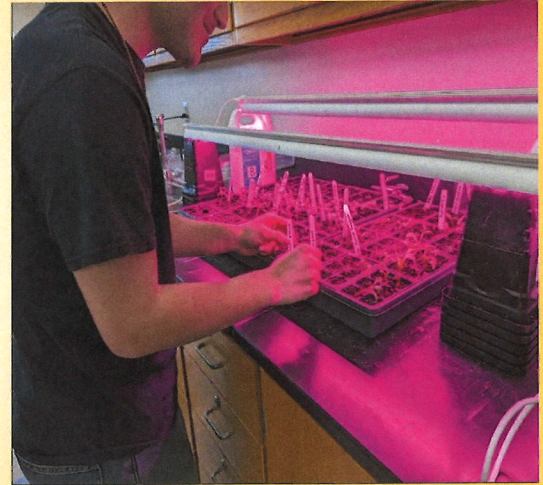


Sustainable Agriculture

Goal of the Course:

Offer students the chance to understand food production, social inequalities in access to food, and learn how to cultivate their own.

East Windsor's agriculture-rich history shapes daily life for residents, so it's important for students to explore the science and history of their community, with a specific focus on sustainable agriculture to foster environmental responsibility in planting, growing, harvesting, and selling products.

Sustainable Agriculture

- Students in Sustainable Ag have explored various farming aspects.
- Topics covered include: agriculture definition, sustainability, soil loss, soil building, composition, water conservation.
- Future topics: integrating animals, hydroponics.
- Activities include planting microgreens and seeds for outdoor crops.
- Planned field trips: with a soil scientist from UCONN Extension, CTFood4Thought hydroponic facility in Torrington.

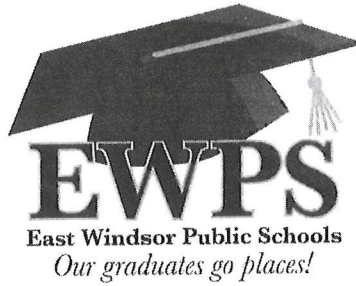
