Broad Brook Elementary School Report

Broad Brook Elementary continues to emphasize attendance, engagement, and community involvement through positive incentives and recognition.

Broad Brook Elementary School held its second attendance incentive on Monday, November 3rd, celebrating students' commitment to regular attendance. A total of 278 students participated in a creative outdoor activity where they decorated the hardtop and sidewalks with colorful chalk drawings. In addition, each participating student added their name to the attendance incentive chart, proudly displayed in the school's main hallway as a visual celebration of their dedication.

Students who earned PAWS awards for the month of October were recognized for their positive behavior and citizenship. Selected students had their photo taken with Biscuit and their pictures are now featured in the main hallway showcase.

Student growth in mathematics continues to be a point of pride. Progress on Reflex Math is being tracked and shared, with 149 students in grades 2–4 leveling up to become “Math Wizards.” These achievements are celebrated as part of BBES' commitment to fostering academic motivation and engagement.

The October Family Mileage Club was another successful event, promoting physical activity and family participation. This month, BBES partnered with the local Cub Scout troop, who facilitated additional exercise stations and awarded stickers to students completing each station. The collaboration brought great energy to the event and helped strengthen connections between BBES and community partners.

Middle School Report

We've had a lot happening at EWMS over the past few weeks! Our 8th graders recently took the PSATs, and several of our 8th grade student leaders attended a leadership conference at American International College in Springfield.

Our 7th graders enjoyed a field trip to Springfield, where they visited four museums, the Michele and Donald D'Amour Museum of Fine Arts, the Springfield Science Museum, the Lyman and Merrie Wood Museum of Springfield History, and The Amazing World of Dr. Seuss Museum.


Our Cross Country team had two meets last week and competed in the Middle School Championship on Saturday, November 1st.








EWHS AP Score Distribution SY24 v. SY25




SAT School Day Alliance District Comparison March 2022 RW




SAT School Day Alliance District Comparison March 2025 RW



SAT School Day Alliance District Comparison March 2022 Math




SAT School Day Alliance District Comparison March 2025 Math






SAT MATH Class of 2026


PSAT RW Class of 2027

Grade 11










PSAT 8/9 RW Class of 2029

ASE Rotation Tier 2 - ELA & Math

- 5 times per week for all students
- 50m, static for semester (or quarter)

- Class sizes of 8 or less.
- Direct Intervention lessons will depend on the skill determined when group students. Teachers will utilize small group instruction daily to work with students in groups of 4 or fewer. Teachers may utilize iXL for groups during independent work time.
- Content development is directly connected to supporting the skill deficits needed to be successful in the current grade level course content unit.

Math Tutor - Tier 2 & 3

- Direct, targeted math intervention based on pSAT and iXL scores.
- Students are working in groups of two or three.
- Students are being pulled from Study Hall or First Year Seminar course one to two times a week.
- Based on attendance and need, tutor may pull students individually during the block, 20 minutes each to differentiate support.

Progress Monitoring:

- iXL domain area of focus determined by Instructional Coach.
- Baseline assessments on targeted skill.
- Tutor checks for understanding and documents practice during each intervention session.
- Students will demonstrate proficiency on skill assessment before moving onto the next skill.
- Tutor meets with Instructional Coach twice a week to review progress data and determine next steps.



The Ad Hoc Committee on School Renovation Planning was formed to create a comprehensive, actionable plan for the renovation of Broad Brook Elementary, East Windsor Middle, and East Windsor High School. The committee has already established two primary options as of September 2025:

- A Renovate-to-New Project for the Elementary School, and
- A New Construction Project for a combined Middle and High School campus facility
- Based on estimated costs and programming advantages, new construction was recommended for the combined middle/high school campus
- New construction was determined to be a lower cost than renovating existing facilities

The Committee is now using this data to develop a final Comprehensive Renovation Plan, focusing on maximizing reimbursement rates provided by the State of Connecticut Offices of Grants Administration (OGA); following this financial and final evaluation, and after communicating with the community, they will issue their final recommendation.

CIP EVALUATION





We are writing to provide you with an update on the status of federal funding from the U.S. Departments of Education (ED) and Agriculture (USDA) considering the ongoing government shutdown.

ED Funding:

- As of today, the CSDE continues to access **all** funds that have been awarded to Connecticut without interruptions.

USDA Funding:

- The September claims for National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program meal reimbursements are currently being processed and will be paid in the next week. The CSDE would like to thank you and staff for the timely submission of the September claims.
- The CSDE has received the USDA funding necessary to support reimbursements for October meal claims and those reimbursements will be processed and paid in November. Please note that October meal claims are due by **November 15th** and timely submission will expedite the reimbursement process.
